


STEDMAN COUSINS



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Dear Cousins,

Summer has arrived at last in England after a very wet Spring and early Summer. Last weekend was the 9th Cousins Reunion and having the sunshine made it even more pleasant. On Friday afternoon some of us met at Yarpole's 12th Century church with it's separate bell tower. With the support of some newer timbers, the massive old oak structure still supports the bells, now struck rather than rung in order to preserve them for the future.



From there we went on to Lucton, the next village, hoping to find traces of Stedmans at the church there. James (1824) his wife Jane and their family had lived and farmed there in 1851, 1861. The surprise was that the church is now a private dwelling! James sons Arthur Robert and George Edward and daughter Minnie Constance, had all been christened there.

Somewhat disappointed we moved on to Kingsland where at least a dozen or our Stedmans had been christened. Kingsland is a lovely busy little village full of interesting houses and worth another visit some time.



Saturday morning we all met at Monkland Cheese Dairy for a guided tour about their cheese production. A number of different cheeses are made including their 'Little Hereford' which is very popular. The milk is sourced locally and we were told that the whey from the cheese making is given to a local pig farmer to feed his drove of pigs, so nothing is wasted. It was fascinating to learn and see the different stages of cheese production on the maturing shelves. The rather more mature ones had thick crusts and looked impossible to cut into, as well as looking rather inedible. We were told that after maturing they are washed and scrubbed before going to the retailers.

Lunch was had in the garden at the Dairy. The ploughman's lunches were enormous with great wedges of Monkland cheese.



After lunch we went to Clun, where their festival was in full swing. Lots of activities including a dog show, stalls selling welcome cold drinks, food and ice cream and a band playing, all making it a pleasant afternoon. Some of the Cousins climbed the hill to see the castle ruins.

The quiz (attached) was fun and amused everyone until the food arrived.

Sunday morning we met at Discoed. The ancient yew tree which is about 5000 years old was growing there long before the church was built. This yew, a male tree is approximately 35 feet in girth. There is a smaller female yew of similar vintage in the corner of the churchyard.



The yew tree can be seen on the second photo. The church spire was really lovely, completely covered in tiles. Behind the church is a Tudor manor house with courtyard and barns.



It was such a quiet and peaceful place to be. Our ancestors certainly lived in a very beautiful part of the country.

As Stephen and I had arranged to go on a train trip by 'The Heart of Wales' railway line, we had to leave at this point. Some Cousins then went on to Cascob which we are yet to hear about.

On our return home we found news of a new Cousin Patrick Baker, and I would like to take this opportunity of welcoming him.
