Dear Cousins,

From The White House we went to Munslow church. Since last years visit we had learnt much about the (devastating) Victorian restoration work in 1869. We wanted to see if there was any trace of the five Stedman graves (that we have read about) remaining inside the church, at least two of which were interred in the chancel. These are in addition to those mentioned on the wall plaque. Sadly there was nothing visible remaining. The floor in the chancel had been completely covered by Victorian tiles and another area was covered with carpeting that is well and truly fixed!

The men then tried searching the old graveyard which we had missed previously. Sadly the of weeds and uneven surfaces prevented any serious search.

The next morning, our Mini Reunion Day was spent looking around Bucknell, locating some of the former homes of our family. Behind the New House Farm we found an interesting old barn (apparently still owned by a Stedman family member), which had been partially restored. On one of the doors were the initials BS (or could it be RS?)



On a higher door was an inscription. We couldnt read it from below and unfortunately the access was up some crumbling steps, so that was given a miss.

In the evening we met for the family meal at The Horse and Jockey in Knighton, where we enjoyed good food and good company. Melody,( Dave and Alexias eldest daughter) compared some of the available old Stedman photos to see if there were any traces of family likenesses, with some remarkable results. To illustrate Melodys findings, compare the photo of Page Stedman (in his Aussie hat in the Stedman family members section) with that of Clive Stedman (in the Cousins section ) on our Web site. This is a fascinating exercise to try.

During our wanderings, we located the former home of Edward Stedman (b.1763) at Cwmygerwyn in Radnorshire.
